VICTORY CONDITIONS: The Polish win at game end if they Control buildings F11, G13, I9 and J11.


BATTLE INTRODUCTION: *GLOWACZOW, POLAND, 9 September 1939* - By the 9th of September, forward German units were already probing the outskirts of Warsaw. During the first week of the campaign the Polish 1st LTB had been sent to numerous areas to plug gaps in the Polish lines, and to disrupt German movements and supplies. In this capacity, the 1st LTB had been successful, also causing losses whenever they ran into Panzers. Now as Polish units fell back from the frontier, the 1st LTB was tasked with keeping corridors open for Polish units trying to fall back to Warsaw, before it was completely cut off. On the

9th of September, the 1st LTB was given just such a task, when supported by the 13th Infantry Division, they moved to dislodge the German 1st Leichte out of Glowaczow.

RALANCE:

- Add an additional 2-4-8 HS to the German at start OB.
- Increase Polish SAN to 3.

Elements of the 13 Kresowa Dywizja Piechoty (Infantry Division) and 1 Batalion Czołgów Lekkich (LTB - Light Tank Battalion) enter on the east edge on Turn 1:

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. EC are Moderate with no wind at start.
- **2.** The PZIIA in the German OB may setup HIP in Concealment Terrain and is revealed as if an Emplaced Gun (A12.34).

- 3. Kindling (B25.11) is NA.
- **4.** Polish elite and 1st Line squads have Assault Fire (A7.36). The Polish are allowed to use Riders (D6.2-.24).
- 5. Voluntary AFV Abandonment (D5.4) is NA.

BATTLE SUMMARY: In support of the 13th Infantry Division, the 1st LTB succeeded in helping drive the Germans out of Glowaczow. The two units held open a corridor for numerous other Polish units to fall back on Warsaw. The 1st LTB then assisted the 13th in falling back on Warsaw itself. However, by the 14th of September, the writing was on the wall for the 1st LTB. The unit was dispersed due to a combination of battlefield losses, maintenance and mechanical issues and a lack of fuel. An ignominious end for a proud, though short-lived battle history.
